



“... THROUGH SHADOWS AND IMAGES TO TRUTH”

In a world where man thinks himself self-sufficient or finds life meaningless, there is a need to discover new images, signs and symbols by which he can pass through the changing shadows to the light of truth.

Our patron, John Henry Newman, was a man before his time, a visionary, who, like all visionaries, suffered much through misunderstanding. He called on the Light to illumine his way in his famous hymn-prayer:

Lead, kindly Light, amid the encircling gloom.

We wonder whether Newman would agree that music is one of the symbols whereby we respond to life and its mysteries, as, for instance, the mystery of evil. Beethoven was no stranger to suffering. Loneliness was his constant companion: deafness tried to make him bitter, and despair was always near. Yet he did not ever give up his belief in life: *Oh, it is so beautiful to live — to live a thousand times!* he wrote to a friend and we are privileged to hear the proof of his belief in the exultant tones of his symphonies.


Adolescence is primarily the age when the development of mysticism takes place. The invasion of record shops by teenagers, the hours spent listening to music, hopefully, is not idle time.

Music's power over the spirit of man is not restricted to the mystical and psychological only. It uproots as well, as Plato wrote: *When modes of music change, the fundamental laws of the state always change with them.*

Elvis Presley showed his disapproval of the fallacy that only science has the answers; the Beatles carried on with the rock-beat that appealed to youth of all cultures to enter into the arena of social protests and with Bob Dylan's *The times they are a changin'* as the movement's theme song.

Matthew Fox writes: *Where human life and the mysteries are engaged for their own sake and where effort is made to share this gift more broadly, there is the Spirit breathing unutterable groans beseeching God for us.*

May this search for truth through images lead us to the realisation: *This is how we know what love is: Christ gave up his life for us, and, we, too, must give up our lives for our brothers.*





Head Master's Foreword


As we come to a close of the decade of the eighties we find that education and the teaching profession are very much in the news. Steps are well in hand to bring about the amalgamation of tertiary institutions across the country despite the misgivings expressed in many quarters. The recently introduced compulsory tax on tertiary education also caused a great deal of controversy and the series of rolling strikes by teachers in Western Australia points to low morale and the erosion of the status of the teaching profession itself. The State Teachers' Union claimed that about a quarter of the teachers had applied for jobs outside the government system in the course of the year. Certainly, far fewer students see teaching as a worthwhile career and many institutions have lowered their entrance scores to enable the filling of quotas. This, of course, raises questions about the likely quality of the teachers who will soon be in our classrooms.

Fortunately, as an independent Catholic school, we have been mostly spared this turmoil in the year which has been recalled in the pages of this magazine. True to the Church's mandate, we vigorously undertake the education of the total human person. This calls for great generosity on the part of the teachers to work both within and outside the set curriculum. It also challenges the students to make the most of the opportunities offered and also become involved in activities outside school hours. The quality of the interaction between teachers and students sets the tone of a school community and is able to enhance the effectiveness of the learning that takes place.

I believe that we can look back on a year which has been blessed in this regard. There has been a high level of student leadership, cooperation and participation which has seen many ventures undertaken with great success. I congratulate and thank all those involved and pray that this precious legacy will continue to characterise Newman Senior as we conclude twenty five years of schooling on the Churchlands site in 1990.

PARENTS' & FRIENDS' ASSOCIATION

This year has seen us re-examining the role of the P&F within the Senior School. We decided to start from scratch and developed a charter or mission statement to guide our activities over the coming years. It came out as follows:

Mission for the Newman Senior P & F Executive

- * Maintain and enhance a spirit of community amongst the students, parents and alumni of Newman College.
- * Enhance the Christian Spiritual Values in the life of the Newman Senior Community.
- * Assist in maintaining and uplifting the image of the College.
- * Be a channel of communication between the Parents of Newman Senior and the school administration and board.
- * Address any concerns of the parent body as a whole with the appropriate persons or bodies.
- * Liaise with Parent activity groups on the Newman Senior Campus and where possible assist in running them.
- * Provide information to parents about matters which may impact the education or welfare of their children.
- * Assist where possible with targeted fund raising activities.
- * Liaise with Newman P & F Executive bodies on other Campuses to plan joint activities and to coordinate other activities.
- * Make parents aware of the activities of the P & F Federation and encourage their participation.

Where relevant, activities and functions will be carried out in conjunction with other bodies or the School Administration. The School Administration and Board will be kept informed of all activities.

During the course of the year (once we were through with navel gazing) we ran some events to address what we believed would be topics of interest to us as parents and of benefit to our students. Key events were — Vision and its impact on learning, Teenage Stress and Tertiary Selections & TEE scoring. These evenings were well attended and gave valuable insights and understanding.

Artcenta 1989 was an outstanding success as is usual and our gratitude as a community goes out to the organisers, to all parent and other helpers and to all those who supported it with their presence. Artcenta funds for 1988 and 1989 have now been distributed and a sum of \$44,550 has been allocated to the senior school. Of this, \$3000 has been earmarked for 1990 P & F activities and the balance is to be targeted at specific projects to be decided with Br Terry Orrell. Once these projects have been identified we will let all parents know.

We made moves to re-examine the College uniform and in conjunction with the other campuses established a uniform committee comprising school principals and parent representatives. Thanks to their efforts we have surveyed parent opinion and have reached some tentative agreement about uniforms across all campuses and the changes to be implemented and phased in over a period of years. As these items are finalised they will be published and sent to parents.

As your P & F committee we have established a Perpetual Shield to be awarded to a student who has made an Outstanding contribution to the School as a community. This award need not necessarily be made every year as it is only for outstanding service. The decision will be made by the staff of the school by ballot and consensus.

Planning for 1990 is well underway. Throughout the year we will try to implement the theme of "Building the Parent Network" in our College for the strengthening of the Newman College community as a whole. Thanks for everything in 1989, and here's to a great 1990.

The Mother's Committee has had a successful year with 20 hardworking mothers always willing to help with the many projects we have been involved in.



These travellers gave the impression of not quite knowing where to go. Their disappointed looks seemed to say, "They told me there would be someone here".




NEWMAN WEEK


The last night was filled with rain and rocks under our tents as we swam laps waiting for sausages, compliments of "Alice".



MURRAY RIVER






FIRST XVIII FOOTBALL




