

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# OUR PATRON JOHN HENRY NEWMAN 1801-1890

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Churchlands Campus

An article from "Newman Grad", the periodical of the Newman Society of W.A., vol.13, No.4, November 1977.

In 1963, Pope John XXIII presided over the Second Vatican Council, called to update and deepen Catholic thinking. Watched by an expectant world, the Fathers of the Council did just that. They searched in the sources of Christianity, turning to the Scriptures and to history rather than to speculation and philosophical systems. We think of the document on the Church and the document on Revelation. They accepted the development of dogma, collegiality, infallibility and the primacy of conscience, as well as consultation of the laity. They noted the relationship of reason to revelation. They realised that the study of the sacred writings is the soul of sacred theology (Vat.II) and echoed Pius XII "without biblical theology, dogmatic theology becomes sterile".

## NEWMAN


A century before this, John Henry Newman had pioneered these ideas. John was born in 1801, the son of a London banker and a French Protestant mother. Calvinism and Fundamentalism surrounded his early years. Formed on daily Scripture reading, he tells us of a conversion at the age of 15, a strong belief in the divinity of Christ, a choice of a celibate life along with an awareness of the presence of God. He learned to love the early Fathers of the Church and fear the Papacy. Trinity College, Oxford, welcomed him in 1816 to University life and, despite missing Honours, he became a Fellow at Oriel in 1822. He asked for Orders and became deacon in 1824, priest in 1825. During a visit to Europe several years later, he suffered a severe illness. Returning to England, he composed "Lead kindly light". A year later, he began "Tracts for the Times", interpreting, in a sense favourable to Catholics, Anglican things. The Tractarian or Oxford movement developed and in 1838 Newman was censured by the Anglicans for Tract 90. Newman retired to a prayer community and seven years later wrote his "Development of Christian Doctrine", defending change in the Church.

## Becomes a Catholic

The same year, 1845, Newman made a decision to become a member of the Catholic Church. Two years later, ordained a priest, he began the Oratory at Birmingham and encouraged Father Faber to establish the London Oratory. In spirited defence of Catholics, the "Present position of Catholics", encouraged by Wiseman, he criticised the violent and antipope campaign and its fomentor, Giacinto Achilli, and faced a libel suit successfully.

## Defence of his faith

Preparing for the still-born Dublin University, he lectured on "The Ideas of a University". Newman's essay on "Consulting the faithful in matters of doctrine" in the Rambler was related to Rome and Newman had to resign from the editorship. In 1864, Charles Kingsley attacked the Roman clergy and Newman particularly. Newman replied in a series of essays "Apologia pro vita sua", which caught the public eye and re-established Newman's importance in the religious life of England. In 1870, Newman justified the faith of the ordinary man, showing the relationship of faith and reason in his "Grammar of Assent". In this year, Vatican I defined Papal Infallibility. Newman thought this inopportune but believed it and when Gladstone attacked Infallibility, Newman defended the Council's definition in a "Letter to the Duke of Norfolk". In this letter is also his defence of the primacy of conscience. 1889 saw his vindication by Rome, when he was appointed a Cardinal. Next year, he died.

## The insight of Newman

In his books and some 20,000 letters is glimpsed Newman's ability to gather insights and express them in a way so complete that every aspect of them is touched. He realised that an idea leads to a number of self-reflections and applications of the idea to other ideas as they develop. He applied this to development of doctrine as seen in politics, history, ethics, metaphysics as well as religion. His intense interest in Scripture, the Fathers of the Church, whence came his appreciation of the Catholic position, gave him scriptural and historical insights. His interest in tradition gave him an insight into the laity's role without weakening his appreciation of the infallible magisterium and of conscience. Finally, his insight into the nature of belief in answer to John Locke's requirements of logical proofs is worthy of note.

## Relevant insights

Newman's insights are so in harmony with Vatican II, the Church in the world today, that to call them relevant seems an understatement. We have all been enriched by them.

*Lead, kindly light,  
amid the encircling gloom,  
Lead thou me on;  
The night is dark,  
and I am far from home,  
Lead thou me on.  
Keep thou my feet:  
I do not ask to see the distant scene;  
one step enough for me.*



I believe this year, marking the centenary of Cardinal John Henry Newman, has been significant in giving impetus to the promotion of the religious dimension within Newman Senior. The challenge to integrate our faith into the school's daily life may appear daunting but having listed down the opportunities on my note-pad, I can see that a lot has been covered.

At the classroom level, students are reaping the rewards of a comprehensive RE programme taken from the Archdiocesan Guidelines. It is to the credit of my predecessor, Mr Eamon Murray, and the RE staff who have worked hard over the past five years to develop and resource a programme that can cover so many aspects of our religion. It is hoped that further curriculum development will take place with the on-going support of the school community.

To complement this programme, students have had the opportunity outside of the classroom to develop themselves personally and their own faith. At Year 10 level, there have been two seminars. The first seminar in Term Two provided the opportunity for students to reflect upon topics such as: social justice, sexuality and drug usage. The second seminar focussed upon students developing a positive self-image and the quality of their relationships with others as presented by Pastor Graham Maybury at his Life-Skills Seminar.

For the Year 11s, it was an opportunity to discover something more of themselves in the face of physical challenges (or in some cases — hardships!). For three days students were expected to endure tenting, cooking, trekking, confidence courses and other such tortuous activities devious staff could devise. The response from students has been very positive and no doubt they have reflected at length upon just how they could have done it. An important aspect of these camps were the reflection times, paraliturgies and journalling when students could privately share their insights with God.

Once again, the Year 12s had a very successful retreat at either Araluen, Lake Cooloongup or Timbarra. Although it was "very chilly" the Marist Retreat Team — Bros. Jim Ryan, Paul Kane and our own Br Des — warmed both the hearts and bodies of students and staff alike. The community spirit and creative responses by the students were very encouraging. A feature of this year's retreats was the Parental Affirmation Letters. Many students found their letters to be significant to them and it is hoped this activity will be repeated next year.

A lot of time and effort this year has also been devoted towards the promotion of liturgies within the school. The emphasis has been upon trying to encourage as much student participation as possible. Of particular note has been the quality of creative expression such as the "mock squabble" by two students at the Ash Wednesday Service or the washing of feet at the Holy Week Paraliturgy. Another feature of the liturgies this year has been the co-operation between campuses. At the start of the year, the Senior School and Siena campuses came together to celebrate the opening of the school year and to herald the centenary of Cardinal Newman. The Mass was celebrated by Archbishop Foley along with Fr. Owen Mason (the school chaplain) and other priests of nearby parishes at the Holy Rosary Church.

Undoubtedly, the culmination of liturgical worship for the school was the Eucharistic Celebration on Newman Day. This involved many hours of planning and preparation across the school campuses. For the first time, Newman College came together as one at the Claremont Superdrome to pay tribute to a great man — John Henry Newman. Such an inspiring event was ably celebrated by Fr. Pat Bishop, the chaplain at St Thomas More College and patron of the Newman Society. With his mellow tones

he charmed all gathered with his sermon on the life of Newman along with the theme of his famous poem: "Lead, kindly Light".

Another aspect of liturgies this year has been the opportunity for students to be involved in the planning of "Liturgies of the Word". Apart from such liturgies during classes and on camps, the highpoint of such planning and preparation occurred at the Speech Night and Graduation. Representatives from the Year 12 student body and Staff worked diligently together under the guidance of the Deputy Principal — Mrs Lynne Thomson — to develop a liturgy on the theme, "Let us part as friends, never to be strangers". I would also like to express my appreciation to the Liturgical Music Ministry at Newman, especially Miss Carol Young, Mr Russell Holmes and Mrs Astrid Gionea who put in so many extra hours preparing both musicians and choir for the various liturgies over the year.

This year has also seen the further promotion of Christian service within the school. For instance, students in Years 11 and 12 have been able to go "tin-rattling" for various charities in Subiaco. I thank them for their good behaviour and efforts and I hope the experience was a positive one for them. During First Term, a Lenten Service Project was set up where the school community was invited to donate clothing and blankets to St Vincent de Paul's Society, Youthcare and Pregnancy Help. At the same time, students were made aware of the plight of the homeless youth and teenage mothers in Perth.


Lastly, the school has seen the re-introduction of a Y.C.S group. The group is part of the Young Christian Students' Movement which was originally established by Cardinal Joseph Cardijn for young people to not only help themselves by reflecting upon Gospel values but to work towards bringing the Kingdom of God into the world today. Such has been the spirit and enthusiasm generated by this group that they represent one of the largest Y.C.S. groups in the diocese. Furthermore, two students represented the movement at a National level at a Formation Session held in Perth this year. This is quite an achievement in such a short space of time and augurs well for the future.

At a time when young people are coloured in shady tones, students at Newman have demonstrated a real concern for their faith and for the world around them.

Next year, our focus will be along the theme of building the Newman community.



Mrs Evershed putting on the finishing touches at Artcenta


# SILVER JUBILEE REUNION



The Year 12 students of 1990 wish members of Curtin Guild, and all other students at the College, the very best for the future.




# NICHOLLS


## DUX 1989

"You just wait Mikhail, we'll get there," muttered the man to his dog.







those who are different and to aim for their personal best in all endeavours.






## MURRAY RIVER


## MASQUERADE BALL







### ITALIAN EXCHANGE

During the Christmas holidays, I was lucky enough to go to Italy as an exchange student. It was an eventful trip, especially the first day or so. 

### FROM INDIANA U.S.A.



## PEER SUPPORT

The Peer Support programme is a scheme organised by the Peer Support Foundation, a non-profit organisation begun in 1971. It is a system run by students, monitored by teachers and has received very positive feedback from the people who have hitherto been involved with it. Already operating in more than two hundred schools in New South Wales alone, it is a system soon to be introduced to Newman College Senior School. The programme was initially set up as a result of a sixteen year old student from Sydney overdosing on heroin. While drug abuse is one of the negative pressures that the scheme targets, by getting Year 12 students working with the Year 10 students the programme aims at reducing bullying and playground violence by building up a sense of family within the school. It will also give the school's new arrivals someone else to turn to in times of trouble or simply someone to talk to when parents, teachers and friends are not suitable. The central idea of the programme is to have older students help the younger ones meet the problems and situations they are likely to face. It basically involves the Year 12 group leaders (two of whom are assigned six or seven younger Year 10 students) passing on their experiences for the others' benefit. This is done by a set of planned activities such as role-playing, discussions and confidence-building session, with the aim of building up people's self-esteem, communication and relationship skills, and ability to make responsible decisions. At the end of 1990, a call will go out urging the Year 11 students to volunteer to be group leaders in the programme. About sixty or seventy of these will be needed to be trained and instructed on how to successfully run the course. As the course's effectiveness depends so much on student attitudes towards it, there must be importance placed upon how the present Year 11s will respond to the programme. We hope for an enthusiastic response.

## SUMMER PROJECT AND KAMP KIDS



*Ain't life grand?*

Do you remember when you were just a kid and your whole world was dominated by grown-ups? Not long ago, was it, for some of you! But you had a nice house, plenty to eat, a nice cosy bed, presents at Christmas and on your birthday, and occasional holidays to break the routine. Well some kids are not so lucky. They come from broken homes; maybe Dad is in prison; maybe their skin is of a different colour and they suffer from prejudice and lack of understanding. Kids like this, especially when they are between the ages of 8 and 12, need to feel that somebody, other than their own families, cares for them, respects them and shows them some good old-fashioned love. That's why the Marist Brothers, helped by the Dominican Sisters and a number of willing school-age volunteers, run a holiday camp for the disadvantaged during the summer vacation, usually in January.

Early this year the third such camp was organised by Br. Neil Mitchell. Twenty-six children — eleven girls and fifteen boys — were taken on a week's holiday to Fairbridge Holiday Village at Pinjarra. There was a team of seventeen adults, including Brothers, Sisters and young people (including some recent ex-students) looking after the camp.

Activities included art and craft work, swimming, outdoor sports, picnics to the beach and into the hills near Serpentine, a great night out at the Carnival in Mandurah, canoeing and a fun concert. Father Owen came down with us and provided a very well-organised Mass one evening. The children were divided into small groups, each having a separate cottage at Fairbridge. There was plenty of opportunity to earn rewards for participation, tidiness and originality. But, most of all, there was a spirit of family and fun.

The cost of the week's holiday was quite high, but each participant contributed something towards the costs, and we received great support from the Archbishop, the School Board, various government bodies, and even businesses like Coca Cola and the Carnival proprietor. Lots of people recognised the worth of what we were doing, and they helped to the best of their ability.

Summer projects are run by the Brothers in other States, too, so we hope that many young people will come to know and appreciate the tremendous potential in young kids, no matter what their circumstances are, or how difficult they can sometimes be.

Barriers soon break down when kids see that there is genuine concern for their welfare, and the whole organising team felt that our Holiday Camp for Disadvantaged Kids this year was as much a gift from God for them as it was for the kids who came and had such a wonderful time at Fairbridge.


