

## “... THROUGH SHADOWS AND IMAGES TO TRUTH”

In a world where man thinks himself self-sufficient or finds life meaningless, there is a need to discover new images, signs and symbols by which he can pass through the changing shadows to the light of truth.

Our patron, John Henry Newman, was a man before his time, a visionary, who, like all visionaries, suffered much through misunderstanding. He called on the Light to illumine his way in his famous hymn-prayer:

*Lead, kindly Light, amid the encircling gloom.*

We wonder whether Newman would agree that music is one of the symbols whereby we respond to life and its mysteries, as, for instance, the mystery of evil. Beethoven was no stranger to suffering. Loneliness was his constant companion: deafness tried to make him bitter, and despair was always near. Yet he did not ever give up his belief in life: *Oh, it is so beautiful to live — to live a thousand times!* he wrote to a friend and we are privileged to hear the proof of his belief in the exultant tones of his symphonies.

Adolescence is primarily the age when the development of mysticism takes place. The invasion of record shops by teenagers, the hours spent listening to music, hopefully, is not idle time.

Music's power over the spirit of man is not restricted to the mystical and psychological only. It uproots as well, as Plato wrote: *When modes of music change, the fundamental laws of the state always change with them.*

Elvis Presley showed his disapproval of the fallacy that only science has the answers; the Beatles carried on with the rock-beat that appealed to youth of all cultures to enter into the arena of social protests and with Bob Dylan's *The times they are a changin'* as the movement's theme song.

Matthew Fox writes: *Where human life and the mysteries are engaged for their own sake and where effort is made to share this gift more broadly, there is the Spirit breathing unutterable groans beseeching God for us.*

May this search for truth through images lead us to the realisation: *This is how we know what love is: Christ gave up his life for us, and, we, too, must give up our lives for our brothers.*

## HEADMASTER'S FOREWORD

This year I am able to identify more closely with those students who are about to leave Newman Senior as I complete my term as Principal and move on to a different aspect of Marist ministry. For this reason, the School Magazine is a more significant document than usual for me with its record of the major events in my final year and especially the photographs of those who trod our school stage in '92. I will certainly be looking forward to future re-unions when the stories will be retold and embellished.

From my vantage point, the year has been one of pause and consolidation in our building and refurbishment programme and development of management models for the school. This was expedient, as the Newman Review Committee was conducting an extensive programme of consultation and analysis of all aspects of the Colleges which operate as the Newman entity. This Report has now been published and will provide a significant blueprint for future development as well as firmly anchor the progress achieved thus far in a comprehensive historical perspective. Already one of the recommendations has been taken - to join the Catholic Education Commission's system of group-funded schools. This will result in a higher level of State and Federal funding and assist in the implementation of other aspects of the Report.

Our graduating Year 12 class has, in numerical terms, been the smallest to move through the Newman secondary classes since the amalgamation in 1983. The tide has turned, however, and the lower secondary numbers are once again at capacity and so this will see a significant increase at the Senior School in the immediate future. This will enable the addition of even more subjects to the impressive list already available to our students.

I leave Newman Senior with a mixture of emotions. I will naturally miss the superb campus and facilities, the professionally competent and generous staff, the vast body of students who relish the educational opportunities offered by the school, those parents who become involved in a variety of ways and contribute much by their expertise and generous support. As a West Australian, I consider it a great privilege to have had the opportunity of spending eight years serving the Marist cause in my home state. I will look forward even more to home visits to note the continued growth and development of Newman and to catch up with those who have made my stay such an enjoyable one.

I wish Brother Stephen well in his appointment to Newman Senior. He too will relish the opportunity of working on his home ground. He comes with many years of administrative experience in a number of Marist schools and boundless energy and expertise. Under his leadership Newman will progress confidently to the year 2000 and beyond.

I congratulate and thank Mrs Liz Parker and her editorial team for producing yet another superb magazine. The memories it evokes will perhaps help brighten some of those unpleasant winter evenings I am threatened with in my move to eastern climes.

I can conclude with no better sentiment than that of St Paul to the Colossians: "May the peace of Christ reign in your hearts, because for this you were called together as parts of one body. Always be thankful."

## FAREWELL, BROTHER TERENCE

Brother Terence Orrell concludes his eight years as Headmaster of the Senior School in December this year. In 1993, he will take up a chaplaincy role at Melbourne University.

Under Brother's guidance and leadership, the Marist spirit has continued to imbue the life of the College. His approach has focussed very much on the education of the total person so that our students will be able to make a positive contribution to society in their post-school years.

During his time at the College, Brother's involvement has not been limited to that of an administrator. He has always insisted on taking an active teaching role in the area of Religious Education and has become heavily involved in Year 11 Camps, Year 12 Retreats, the S.R.C. Camp and the Marist Summer Project for disadvantaged children. He has been a strong supporter of the extra-curricular activities of the College, be it as coach, participant or spectator.

Brother's first year at the College saw the introduction of the Guild system which had been developed prior to his arrival. Under his guidance, the Guild system has gradually been refined to cater more fully for the pastoral needs of the students. From a staffing point of view, Brother Terry has overseen the introduction of a new middle management structure encompassing Department Heads and Year Heads, as well as a programme of staff appraisal.

One of the features of Brother's term as Headmaster has been the refurbishment and building programmes that have been undertaken. This has provided students with excellent facilities in both the academic and sporting spheres. The impressive list of changes includes the refurbishment of the Hall, Science laboratories, Early Childhood Studies room, Administration block and Staff room, together with the building of the North Wing and the Physical Education Centre.

The Newman Sports' Association has benefited considerably from Brother's resolve to bring together many of the sporting clubs associated with the Newman system. In recognition of his efforts in this regard, Brother Terry has recently been honoured with the inaugural life membership of the Newman Sports Association.

In light of the significant development that has taken place under Brother's leadership over the last eight years, it is appropriate that he leaves us at a time when the recommendations of the Newman Review will lead the College into its next phase of growth. On behalf of the Newman community we thank Brother Terry for all that he has done for us and wish him well in all his future endeavours.

## VALEDICTORY 1992

Tim: Tonight Shannon and I stand before you, the Newman Community to present you with the 1992 school year the way we, the student body saw it. Tonight highlights the achievements in our final year, not only as individuals, but as a group of tightly knit Year 12 students and friends. We now ask you to join us as we reflect upon the past year.

1992 has been blessed with success in all aspects of school life. This success must be attributed to the unique environment provided by Newman College. One of the invaluable services which helps in the development of such a beneficial school environment is the religious education programme provided at our school. This helps to bring the students together, to form a happy working atmosphere and to increase the capacity for us to grow as individuals in preparation for the next stage in life. The programme gives us an insight into the responsibilities required for adulthood.

Another aspect of religious life at Newman is the Peer Support Programme which has been running for the past two years. Again it proved to be a success by further bridging the gap between year groups and nurturing friendships. It contributed to Newman's harmonious surroundings and prevented the traditional bell beats and Year 10 lunchtime singalongs.

Shannon: One of the first events on the agenda for 1992 was the ACC Swimming Carnival where the SRC provided our swimmers with some purely inspirational cheering. This was performed by an enthusiastic bunch of well prepared Romans known as the Newman Cheer Squad. Despite the fading whimpers of the Cheer Squad, the team performed quite admirably, once more upholding Newman's reputation as one of the top sporting schools.

Fundraising was a prominent feature of the SRC's early calendar as the 1992 Ball was fast approaching. A variety of methods were used and no-one was spared from these events. The revival of the annual SRC Tennis Competition proved successful. Random selections were made so that everyone had a chance to win. This proved to be the case as Sonya's experience compensated for Tim's lack of skill, enabling them to take out the title.

Early in Second Term, the Battle of the Bands was held, bringing together an audience that would do Wembley Stadium proud. The two bands, the Trash Dogs and the Low Downs, both with different approaches to the art of music, put on a thunderous performance. This angered the Science Department who were conducting a Chemistry test while pre-gig sound checks were being done.

Tim: The sporting circuit for Newman was a more prosperous one than usual with the vast majority of our many teams making the final series. Many teams continued on this winning note throughout the season. Examples of this were the Hockey teams - both Boys' and Girls', the Boys' Basketball Team and the First Eleven Rugby Team, all of which challenged strongly for the title but were narrowly defeated in Finals games.

Some teams went a step further and finished the season with a Premiership. The Girls' Soccer Team was one of these with girls from Years Ten, Eleven and Twelve all competing. The girls fought hard to take out the title and beat Craigie in a 1-0 game at the Velodrome. Congratulations to all the soccer girls and to all the other teams who again did Newman proud.

Football again was a prominent aspect of Newman's sporting and social environment. The First Eighteen, led by Nick Constantine and Mr Pill, completed the minor round undefeated and looked favourites for the title. However, a loss to Wesley, our arch rivals in the semi-final, meant that hard work was still needed to finish the season one step higher than last year. After a tight preliminary final against Mazenod for the second year in a row, Newman again had the chance to play for the Quit Cup. Despite Mrs Harzell's reservations and probably those of the remainder of the staff, the team was allowed to attend the same Year 12 Retreat which finished on the same day as the Grand Final. 





### ANSETT AIRLINES

In July I had the privilege of working at the Airport with Ansett Airlines. I was lucky enough to be selected and placed by the 'Teachers in Industry Placement Scheme' which has been set up to allow Careers and Guidance Teachers to investigate an area of industry of their choosing and to relate their findings and experiences back to the students, giving them a more realistic idea of what is actually happening in industry today. The change in environment, duties and working hours (I worked shift hours starting at 5.00am) I found invigorating, and being so close to aircraft plus helping to load, fuel and organise them for departure etc. was a welcome change from teaching duties!

However, my main purpose in being 'at work' was to enquire about the effectiveness of the present day school curriculum in relation to qualifications and qualities needed by School Leavers when they move into the workforce. I discovered that students taking work experience, according to the employers, became more aware of what was required of them as potential employees, and more realistic about their abilities and career decisions by being 'curious' about the job, thus becoming motivated to use the school curriculum to their advantage. Subject knowledge, although essential, was not enough by itself. A student needs other qualities, e.g. ability to relate to others, to be decisive, to be organised, to be articulate etc., if he or she is to succeed in gaining and progressing in a successful career.

It is therefore encouraging to see that schools and industry are looking very closely at the transition required from school to work and I, for one, see this exercise as a step in the right direction, not only for the awareness of teachers, but in making some aspects of education more relevant to industry and also allowing industry to perceive the total nature of a good education.



I have been fortunate enough to work in an English Department staffed with outrageously helpful, kind and supportive people, so my heartfelt gratitude goes to Mrs Nunn (such a nice change to have a female boss; Mrs Staunton (may your handbag-wielding wrist grow ever stronger); Mrs Lewis (enjoy the pool); Mrs Bekkers (I won't forget the boronia); Mrs Hartzell (she of the never ending patience); Mrs Outtrim (what's the Italian for Retreat?); Mrs Anstee (thanks for the Henry V video); and lastly, Mr Cormican (have fun in Belfast).

I've had two very good, cooperative, hard-working Year 11 Literature classes. I'd like to wish you all a happy holiday, your last summer holiday at school if you think about it. One more year at Newman - make the most of it. Keep up the reading, even if you don't do Lit. next year.



After some rather embarrassing and entertaining solo presentations by group representatives, lunch was hurriedly eaten and a short but meaningful Mass was celebrated to end off the day.







Wednesday night was our lantern stalk when we braved the bush in darkness, to attempt to steal the light away from Mr Drabble, an almost impossible task.

We were split into two groups and for two days we hiked and the other two we canoed. Group A went hiking first, Group B canoed first.



On the second night the two groups camped together and exchanged advice and stories from our experiences, trying to help the other group have an easier time and not repeat our mistakes.

Miss Sue Jeffrey who was here on 'Prac' from U.W.A. during Term Three, officially joined the Department in Term Four to replace Mrs Anstee who went on long service leave. Miss Jeffrey taught Year 10 English along with Theatre Arts.

Once again, it has been a very busy year for the staff of the English Department, with many 'out of class' activities being offered to students.

For those students who were interested, in particular the Literature and Theatre Arts students, there have been several Theatre visits organized over the year. In Term One, Shakespeare's *Antony and Cleopatra*, a text on the Year 12 Literature syllabus was performed by the State Theatre Company and a large group of students and staff enjoyed a very professional production. Later in that term a group attended a vigorous and entertaining performance of Wycherley's *The Country Wife*. The students' proximity to the stage and, therefore, the actors, ensured their close attention to and enjoyment of plays at the State Theatre Company.

In Term Two, a very unusual and stylised performance of Oscar Wilde's *Salome* at His Majesty's Theatre was seen and appreciated by a group of Year 12 Literature and Theatre Arts students.

In Term Three, a disappointingly small number of students attended a performance of Michael Gow's *Away*. Those who did go, thoroughly enjoyed the play, which is also on the Year 12 Lit. Syllabus.

We had four teams (two Senior and two Junior) in the W.A.D.L. Competition in Terms One and Two, and as usual, our teams performed very well. I would like to thank Mrs Bekkers and Mrs Lewis for their help with these teams.

In Term Three, we had a Year 10 team debate in a special competition run by the Graduate Careers Service at Edith Cowan University, but we were narrowly beaten. We had the onerous task of trying to prove that 'Tertiary and Further Education is not an investment in Australia's economy'. We also had a Junior and Senior team in the N.I.C.C. earlier in the year, and they too were very successful.

It was pleasing to see how many students became involved in the various Public Speaking Competitions offered this year, and I want to thank Ms Lappin for all her time and effort spent helping those students. I'm sure they all benefitted from her expertise, and from the experience of having to speak in public.

The Department also offered students several courses, 'out of class' time again, aimed at improving different literacy skills. Mrs Staunton ran two Essay Writing courses over a period of four weeks each, and it was pleasing to see how many students attended. Each course was over-subscribed, and had to be limited to Year 12s. Ms Lappin ran a Back to Basics language skills course, and Non-Print Media Study classes for Year 12s who were sitting TEE English as private students. Mrs Staunton also organized, and she and I ran, a short course of lessons on Objective Comprehension Skills which hopefully will benefit students in their other subjects as well.

Mrs Bekkers has run lunchtime tutorials for interested E.S.L. students, and organized a very pleasant Dim Sum luncheon which was enjoyed by

quite a few staff and most of the Overseas students. Our Librarian, Mrs Parker, has also been involved in English tutoring of Year 10 overseas students as there was no formal Year 10 E.S.L. class, and I would like to thank her for her help and enthusiasm in this area.

With the increased pressure on students trying to enter Tertiary Institutions and the demands on their literacy skills, we have tried to give students as many opportunities as possible to improve their skills. I am very grateful to the members of the English Department for their generosity in offering this extra help to interested students, and I know that the students who take up these opportunities appreciate the efforts of the staff.

I want to warmly thank the members of the Department for their dedication and professionalism, and finally, to wish Ms Lappin all the best for her return to Glasgow next year. As well as her new ideas and initiatives, we have certainly enjoyed her sense of humour and "funny" accent.


The high point of the exhibition was the outstanding collection of Year 12 art. Each painting and print showed clear evidence of individual style and exciting interpretations of theme.






Finally we regrouped and set about the trek homeward. In all, the trip was a success in that it allowed us to actually see what we had recently studied as applied to reality.

This year saw the implementation of different ideas in the Computing curriculum.



The event gave students from the various schools the opportunity to meet with other students who learn French. The evening was very enjoyable and a great success.



1992 was a year of firsts for Physical Education at Newman. Year 11 Physical Education Studies was added as an alternative SEA subject, and was selected by 54 students. These students wave- skied, volleyballed and squashed their way through the year as well as learning about body systems, community sport and recreation and health and fitness. In 1993, Physical Education Studies will be available in Years 11 and 12.

Newman representative teams kept intact their respected status in Champion Schools' Competitions with several teams making finals and others improving on efforts of previous years. The 1st XVIII Football team reversed last year's placings, winning the Quit Cup, and the Girls' soccer team remained undefeated to win the Champion School Trophy for the second time in three years.

Other successful teams to make the finals included: the boys' 1st XI hockey team (State runners-up) and the girls' 1st XI hockey team, the boys and girls basketball teams, the boys' baseball team, the 1st XV rugby, girls' netball and the 1st XI cricket team.

In all Newman was represented in 22 Champion Schools' Competitions, as well as ACC Athletics, Swimming and Cross Country. With so many sports on offer there is ample opportunity for all those who wish to participate.

The quality of work in this Statewide competition was very high and the success of these students is a credit to them.



## SECWA MODEL SOLAR-ELECTRIC CAR CHALLENGE





Next were the big games. The coach put everyone in positions and they played, rotating the players and their positions every ten minutes. Penny was exhausted, I could tell by the look on her face, but she was fighting and I was very impressed with her skills. She may not have been the best player on the court, but she was just as good as most of the others.



My main reason for coming to Australia is to study, so I try and concentrate on my schoolwork. I don't know very much about the Australian people or their lifestyle. Sometimes I think they can be cruel or rude to people from other countries. They don't understand what it is like to be in a new place where things are so different. Some people are friendly and helpful but others just laugh at my mistakes.

In this country, a lot of younger people don't really care about their education. They like to have fun. They go to parties or watch T.V. or listen to music. But I feel different from this. One of the main reasons I came to this country was to learn, and get a better education than in my home country.

I have become used to living in Australia but it takes time. When everything is new, new language and new people, it makes me confused and scared. At first I felt lonely - I wished I could have returned to my home country. But after a while I became used to being here, and now I enjoy it very much.

On my very first school day I had a funny experience. I was on my way to school and asked the bus driver for directions to Newman College. "New-Man College, please", I said. The bus driver replied "Aren't you happy with your present man?". Then the whole bus started laughing, but I didn't understand why, until a friend explained it to me later on. So I have to be very careful with how I pronounce certain words.

Even though I have some problems with language and being homesick, I am glad to be here. Perth is a nice place to live and I can get a good education here which is important to me.

Australia is a pleasant place to live but for someone who grew up in the big city like Taipei, life here can be boring. Even going to the beach too often is monotonous. In Taiwan school filled the week, from seven in the morning to five-thirty in the afternoon, Monday to Saturday and half a day on Sunday. Here I have more time out of school but less to do isolated in suburban Australia.

My first day at Newman College was full of good impressions. Although a little nervous about how hard I would have to work to prepare for the TEE next year, it was better than my previous school (Churchlands Senior High School). The facilities are attractive and with only about six hundred upper school students discipline is much less of a problem. Everyone wears a uniform which improves the general atmosphere.

Another thing I like is that Newman College complements family standards. Students are not allowed to swear and politeness is encouraged. In R.E. Class we are taught to treat everyone the same but some students cannot accept this. One funny thing that has surprised me is the students who borrow money which they say is for calls or canteen. Most teachers are very tolerant but one or two are quick to judge without evidence, especially when overseas students lapse into their first language. It is hard for us to remember that it is always more acceptable to speak English. I admire those teachers who have tried to help me as much as possible, and treated me like an Australian.

Many people think that studying overseas is one of the best things that could ever happen. This may be right but haven't they forgotten something important?



# SPORTS

## A HISTORY OF SPORT AND PHYSICAL EDUCATION AT NEWMAN COLLEGE

Sport at Newman College can be traced back to 1913 and St Ildephonsus College which had Marist Brothers on its staff. At this time competitive physical activity was seen as an avenue for social acceptance and status, a means of demonstrating athletic excellence, and as a source of fun. The sports on offer to the students were football, cricket, athletics and handball.

The emphasis remained on these sports until 1926 when more sports were added to the College programme, namely hockey, tennis and rifle shooting. Sport enjoyed a high profile at the College due to the generous allocation of magazine space, the provision of sports blazers, and photographic displays. Physical training was a part of the general curriculum.

In 1954 the Marist Brothers opened a Marist College in Subiaco. Sporting teams were quickly established, continuing the same athletic ideals established by the Marist Brothers whilst at St Ildephonsus College. House competitions occurred in cricket, football, hockey, athletics, tennis, handball and rifle shooting throughout the year.




In 1965 the Marist Brothers opened the campus at Churchlands to cater for senior secondary students. Physical training gave way in the curriculum to formal instruction in physical education in 1967 with the appointment of a qualified, physical education teacher. This new program aimed to promote students' physical development and the mastery of basic sports skills in a variety of sports.

The College became co-educational in 1977, and quickly began establishing a reputation as a school capable of producing outstanding sports teams. Physical education classes at this time reflected a strong sports education approach.

Newman College now boasts a diverse sports programme with teams fielded in athletics, swimming, cross-country, football, volleyball, hockey, netball, surfing, rugby union, basketball, soccer, golf, softball, baseball, gaelic football, cricket and triathalons. Newman is renowned as a strong and successful sporting school. The physical education programme now reflects a 'life skills' education philosophy with classes compulsory in all year levels. Under the department's umbrella are the Year 10s Outdoor Education and Health Education options and Physical Education studies in Years 11 and 12.

Sport and physical education have come a long way in a short time.


On the serious side, the Age Champion events were very keenly contested in all age groups. This led to excellent swimming and some very close finishes.






## THE NEWMAN GIFT



## 1ST XV RUGBY INVITATION 7's RUGBY COMPETITION


Newman was again asked to play in the invitational Rugby 7s this year. It was a good pre-season warmup, and our results improved as the day progressed.


## GOLF


